Finger Knitting




Theres nothing like knitting a scarf with your own hands, which you will be able to do in a snap! Grab a leftover skein of yarn and get to stitchin' for your newest winter accessory, no knitting skills needed. Create long chain scarves out of solid, or an array of colors in an hour or two at most.

Step 1 — Slip Knot




Begin by making a slip knot, leaving a tail 4-6 inches long (to weave in later).

Step 2 — Index Finger

Step 3 — Make your loops



Now to "cast on" your first set of stitches; take the yarn under, over, under towards the pinky and back the opposite way. This is your first row of stitches!

Step 4 — Pull Over



Since still casting on, you need to do the over/under each finger once again, so that each has 2 yarns on them. Now you are ready to "knit" each of the four by pulling the first yarn over the second, starting with the pinky.

Step 5 — Repeat



Pull each yarn (closest to your palm) over the second, and off your finger. This has created one new row! Now all you need to do is repeat adding a second yarn to each finger, and pulling the first off. Make sure to end on the same side each time, this creates more uniform stitches. Hooray you have created your own finger
