A simple capelet to keep you warm in style this winter!! We love wearing our capelet with bright pink leggings and a cashmere turtle neck. Bring the look up a notch with a pair of suede knee high boots!!! We hope you will love your capelet too!!! xoxo SBIG

Materials

1M of wool 1M of lining of your choice(have fun with it and go with crazy prints) 3M of 2"wide Grosgrain ribbon

Step 1 — just download the instructions file

sewing to go - CAPE

MATERIALS:

Fabric: 60" wide - 1.25 metres, 45" wide - 1.5 metres
Fabric Recommended: nothing too flimsy or too lightweight - wool, felt, medium weight cotton twill
Lining: med. weight cotton
Interfacing: fusible woven/non woven
Ribbon: 3m, 2" wide.

(CUTTING)

Out all necessary pieces from fabrics.

NOTE:

All seam allowances are 1/2 inch, unless otherwise stated. SEAM ALLOWANCE ON PATTERNS HAS BEEN INCLUDED

INSTRUCTIONS:

STEP 1

Transfer the marking from pattern to the fabric. Mark the "dot" on the WRONG side of the fabric

STEP 2.

- with RIGHT sides facing together, stitch the lining and the "good" side along the 2 sides and bottom from dot to dot
- "leave an opening at the bottom of cape approx 3"
- stitch the neckline together with the right sides of the fabric facing together

NOTE:

there will now be 2 openings on each sides of the neck, as well a 3" opening at the bottom.

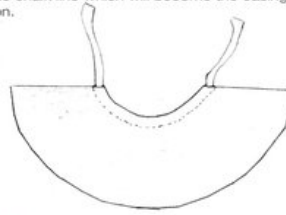


STEP 3.

- turn the inside out through the opening at the bottom
- press (iron) all edges

STEP 4.

- mark a line 2" from the finished neck edge, stitch on the chalk line which will become the casing for the ribbon.



STEP 5.

- insert the ribbon through the casing

Your cape is done and you are ready for Fall!

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

right side: is the "good" side of the fabric, basically the side you want the world to see

wrong side: is the "bad" side of the fabric, basically the side you do NOT want the world to see.

seam allowance: is the distance between the cut edge and the sewing line
